You will want to follow Barb Lebo's campaign to change this. What you're coming up against is the huge wall in place to keep the status quo going. This is just one aspect of the discrimination against people with disabilities that persists in the way we deliver services in Ontario (and beyond). Trust me. Your child's "privacy" - and that of the other kids - is not what's driving this. What we're tackling here are union positions that view private professionals as threats - not colleagues - and a system-die prejudice that the "equity" principle is served by giving everyone nothing. This is a huge front in the battle for our kids to have equal treatment in the education system but it is a marathon - not a sprint. In the short term, we each have to push where we can to get what we can for our individual children. There are some of us here who have become pretty good at this over the years and I think I speak for my peers: we're happy to help support you in doing that. In the long run, we should all be supporting the notion of an education system that provides access to an education in a manner that actually works for our kids - not after that access principle has been trumped by Union and/or other professional/Board/Ministry interests.
